

Happy 17th Birthday, James Peak Wilderness!

On August 21st, 2002, the James Peak Wilderness was established by Congress and signed into law by President George W. Bush.

Did you know that James Peak (13,294 feet) was named for Edwin James, an American physician and botanist who traveled to Colorado on the 1819 U.S. Army expedition Bordered by Indian Peaks Wilderness to the north, the 17,015 acre James Peak Wilderness is located within Boulder, Gilpin and Clear Creek counties. Adjacent to the Continental Divide on the eastern slope, James Peak Wilderness includes several peaks over 13,000 feet and more than a dozen alpine lakes. The area's elevation ranges from 9,200 to 13,294 feet, which includes upper montane, sub-alpine, and alpine ecosystems of the Rocky Mountains.

Trail Project Recap

Earlier in July, the IPWA worked on the first segment of the new trail from Mitchell Lake to Blue Lake. This was a two-day joint project between the Rocky Mountain Conservancy, the USFS and IPWA that was funded by grant money. Over 20 people participated on

both days. It's a historic re-routing as the original trail to Blue Lake has been in use for decades. Massive increases in foot traffic over the last few years has been leading to significant damage on the original trail, especially in the boggy areas above Mitchell Lake.
